Back in June I attended an online Webinar spon-

sored by the United Church of Christ, designed to offer suggestions to pastors as to how to effectively navigate the current political season. There were three presenters on the Webinar, and all three gave basically the same advice. As a community of faith, we are grounded in Biblical teaching, particularly in the teaching and example of Jesus, and so that is where we need to look when searching our hearts. What are our core values? How do we best live out Jesus' command to love our neighbors as ourselves? How can we find common ground, despite our differences, in order to respect the sacred humanity in all?

I have talked before about my love/hate relationship with social media. At its best it can lift up and inform. At its worst it can not only mock and dehumanize, but it can also spread dangerously false information. A friend recently posted something on Facebook that I really appreciated. It was suggestions on how we might "post wisely" in the coming weeks. Some of the suggestions were to: contribute to the discussion, not the division - don't take the "bait" – and check your facts. I think all of this is good advice.

This same friend posted something else recently that I particularly liked. It was titled, "A Gentle Reminder," and I want to share it here. Allow me to leave you, then, with these words:

A Gentle Reminder

- Be the hope.
- Be the change.
- Be the light.
- Be the inspiration.
- Be the goodness.
- Be the love.
- Be the magic.
- Be the support.
- Be the kindness.
- Be that one.

A good reminder for all of us, indeed.

Dublin Community Church Financial Summary – through July 31, 2024

Financial Update: Thank you for your generosity and ongoing support of <u>the</u> Dublin Community Church!

For the Month

Contributions totaling \$41,092 were *favorable* to plan by \$4,181 or 111% of plan

Total Operating Revenue totaling \$57,517 were favorable to plan by \$9,310 or 119% of plan

Total Operating Expenses totaling \$246,382 were *unfavorable* to plan by \$165,738 or 306% of plan.

Total Operating Expenses included a payment to pay off the mortgage of \$188,464 as a transfer from capital reserves.

Net cash flow for the month was *unfavorable* to plan by total expenses exceeding total operating revenue by \$188,865.

Year-to-date

- Contributions of \$250,403 was *unfavorable* to plan by \$7,974 or 97% of plan
- Total Operating Revenue of \$564,910 was *favorable* to plan by \$227,461 or 167% of plan Total Operating Revenue includes a transfer of \$252,241 from the capital reserve for renovation of the Goodwill room

Total Operating Expense of \$ 921,403 was *unfavorable* to plan by **\$356,895** or **163%** of plan due to costs for renovations and final payment of mortgage.

August 2024 Moderator Moment

Great news, the mortgage has officially been paid off! Council approved this in June and the final payment was completed. The financials for July /August will be impacted by this payment.

- B&G replaced the cracked steps leading to the preschool and will be adding a handrail in the future
- A \$25k grant was awarded to DCC by the Dublin Community Improvement Corporation for repairs to the chapel, a historic building in Dublin! Work will begin in the coming months.
- The new member luncheon was fantastic, a special thanks to the Kitchen committee for their support.

I'm continually amazed by the love and care that is provided to DCC by the DCC committees and staff, I can't thank them enough.

GREEN TEAM BUCKET BRIGADE FUNDRAISER

The Green Team is raising funds to acquire on site compost services for the months of October, November, and December. If we raise \$240.00 **Compost Exchange** will be picking up 5 - 5 gallon buckets full of compost from preschool and church waste once a week and exchanging them with 5 - 5 gallon buckets that are clean.

For the next 6 weeks, you can bring compost from your home and deposit it in our five -5 gallon compost buckets for a donation and the Green Team will haul the compost to a community compost location.

We are looking for **10** families a week interested in trying this program out and donating at least **\$4.00**/ **week** to the cause.

Kitchen Compost

Meat and fish (including bones); cheese, eggs, and dairy; fruit and vegetable scraps; any foods cooked in oils/fats; pasta, rice, and grains; coffee grounds, and filters; tea and tea bags; shells from eggs, peanuts, and nuts; bread and baked goods, paper towels, and newspaper; compostable service ware.

The Green Team is making more headway, not only in recycling, but also in composting. **Compost** is collected after every church event and weekly from other meetings at the church. The team has been working to make sure that the waste is sorted to go into the proper collection bins. We know a thing or two about **the "do's and don'ts of composting**. One "do" is to make sure that only food items, napkins and certified compostable materials go in the composting bin. Paper plates and cups need this marking to be used in composting. Paper plates or bowls with a wax coating are not compostable. Nor are they recyclable paper once they have food on them. These items go in the landfill bin.

<u>Kudos</u> to our Fellowship and Kitchen Committees for doing their part to assist in keeping things as green as possible. Special thanks to the Kitchen Committee for collecting from tables during events in the Goodwill room to help keep the compost from being contaminated.

Compostable materials make up more than one quarter of the landfill content, so it is a big deal when it comes to our environment. Please go here to learn more about composting and where you can drop off food waste.

General Programme Updates Aadhar Kendra Sponsorship Programme

The Aadhar Kendra team grew this quarter. We now have a new English and Math teacher who will work out of the Ramtekdi centre and a new Supervisor who will work on getting new local sponsors on board to bring the number up from 198 sponsors for 262 children. New sponsors will help us to enroll the children in our waiting list as well.

This Quarter covers the end of the academic year, the summer break and the beginning of a new academic year for the children. In the summer break, the children had access to a few days of +hobby classes where fun activities and workshops were organised. We had seniors from the Vriddha Mitra programme conduct some sessions for the children in a wonderful cross programme activity. We are looking to increase interaction between the young people in our programmes with the elderly as we try to bridge the gap between generations.

The children's height and weight were recorded and will be considered as we rework the meals that are provided. Based on feedback from parents we organised parent workshops in this quarter as well.

Sessions for the children covered self-awareness, good communication and practical life skills for personal and professional growth. A session focused on emotions was conducted where young people were introduced to identification, understanding, and healthy expression of emotions.

This year we have started with regular field worker meetings with children at the three locations. Topics of discussion at these meetings range from studies, health, school performance and other support where needed. School material was distributed in this quarter - school bags, books, stationery, and uniforms.





DEEP GRIHA—continued

City of Child



Local support from individuals and companies for CoC has been growing over the years and this quarter has been no different. We received tables and stools for the dining room and a big water cooler as donations-in-kind from a company. This means the children don't sit on the floor for meal times anymore and they are very happy to have access to cold drinking water, especially through the summer. Apart from these large donations, groceries, fruit, and snack donations continue. We had employees from BNY celebrate the April birthdays with the children and they organised a lot of fun games

and activities.

In this quarter, we finally started computer classes for children and adults from Kasurdi village. Our biggest challenge was to find a computer teacher for the classes in Kasurdi, we now have a resident teacher. The teacher conducts classes for the village school for a few hours, then classes for individuals from in and around Kasurdi village, and finally for the children at CoC. We have 43 individuals from outside of CoC attending classes and the 44 young boys currently at CoC taking the total number of students to 87.



The counsellor sessions are back after the summer break, and they will be reviewing the Individual Development Plans that were made last year. Before the summer break, the counsellors conducted aptitude tests for children from Grades 9 and 10, to help them decide what they would like to choose for further studies after they finish school.

Agriculture



We harvested 2,956 kg (6,517 lbs) onions in this quarter. Most of them were stored for use at the City of Child and the excess was sent to the urban centres to be used for meal prep.

The polyhouse continues to provide vegetables for the kitchen and this quarter produced:

Deep Griha Academy

Deep Griha Academy has been focused on helping children cover learning gaps over the last few years. Virtual classes and no classes for some students over the lockdown period really affected what they knew and retained. The teachers work on diagnostic tests for the children at the beginning of the year so the teacher can plan lessons based on the varying needs of the classroom. The summer training for the teachers revolved around diagnostic tests and how to get the most out of them.



The numbers at school are dropping and not going up because of a Government permission that we haven't received. The administrative team has been following up with the respective department and we hope to have a solution this year. We currently have 190 students enrolled at school.

School has had regular community outreach over the months. We have been visiting two local government schools regularly for computer and language enrichment classes. The idea is to ensure access to quality education for all children, whether they are enrolled at DGA or not.



A two day summer activity camp was organised during the school holidays for children residing around the school.



The school also organised a Gynaec camp for girls and women from the community, with a plan to organise follow up camps for the women. The monthly Dental camps stopped for the summer break and will restart soon.

The school has a special needs educator who works with students with special learning needs and is using tools to help students with behavioural issues as well. The teachers have seen a positive response to the peer learning initiative, where students are responsible for each other's learning.

Activities to ensure a healthy mind and body, celebration of environment day and life skills training are small steps in ensuring that we facilitate holistic learning and are preparing the children to be thoughtful, productive and environmentally conscious citizens of the world.
