But I also know, of course, that there are still many children for whom summer break is more of a challenge. And I hope and pray for those children that they are able to find nurture, calm, hope, safety, and peace.

KINDLING JOY

About eight years ago, I had the opportunity to attend a CREDO seminar sponsored by the UCC Pension Boards. This weeklong seminar was designed to help clergy focus their attention on wellness in a variety of areas—spirituality, vocation, physical and psychological health, relationships, and finance.



One takeaway from the CREDO program that I still remember is the concept of "kindling joy." Where do you find your joy? Do you even know? Somewhere within each of us is a fire. If we are not careful, we can lose sight of it. Sometimes the pressures of the world bear down on it and our joy gets stifled. Other times, life seems to nearly stamp it out. Sometimes we move so far from our joy that we forget it's even there. Have you ever struggled, trying to "create" joy, as if from nothing? It's pretty hard work, and often what we come up with somehow still leaves us feeling empty or cold.

John 15 recounts part of Jesus' address to his disciples on his last night with them. He prayed for them. He gave them the assurance of God's love and instructed them (and us) to love one another. Then he explained, "I have said these things to you so that my joy will be in you and your joy will be complete" (John 15:11, CEB). In the days that followed, the disciples would see their hopes dashed as Jesus was arrested, convicted, and executed. Even after meeting the risen Christ, the disciples struggled to live into the reality of resurrection joy. It wasn't until the day of Pentecost that the wind and flame of the Spirit stirred them to the fullness of life God intended, moving them from behind locked doors out into the world that awaited them.

Like all of God's gifts, joy must be attended to. It requires stewardship and courage. Each of us has to do the work of tending the life-giving fire that resides somewhere within us. Sometimes we have to bend low and blow gently upon the embers. At other times, we have to go searching outside of our normal, comfortable territory to find enough fuel to keep our joy-fire alive. It takes effort to kindle our joy, but it is work we must do. If we don't, inevitably our spirits, our work, and our relationships suffer.

Perhaps the world feels dark and scary to you right now. If so, there is more reason than ever not to neglect the light. How are you cultivating your joy, and how are you bringing light and life to the world around you? If we all kindled a little more joy in our lives, the world would be a happier, more spirit-filled place. Thank you, each of you, for helping to kindle joy in my life.

Finance Committee Report

Dublin Community Church Financial Summary – through April 2025

<u>Financial Update:</u> Operating revenue and expense are favorable to plan both for the month of April and Year to Date. Thank you for your generosity and ongoing support of <u>the</u> Dublin Community Church!

For the Month

- Contributions of \$51,083 were favorable to plan by \$10,727 or 27%. This was primarily driven by favorability in pledged contributions.
- Total Operating Revenue of \$60,576 was favorable to plan by \$9,684 or 19%.
- Total Operating Expense of \$43,691 was favorable to plan by \$7,182 or 14% (e.g. expenses were 86% of plan).
- Net cash flow for the month was favorable to plan by \$16,866.

Year-to-date

Net Cash Flow fav. / (unfav.)

- Contributions of \$174,047 were favorable to plan by \$12,623 or 8%.
- Total Operating Revenue of \$211,990 was favorable to plan by \$8,422 or 4%.
- Total Operating Expense of \$191,240 was *favorable* to plan by \$12,252 or 6% (e.g. expenses were 94% of plan).

DCC RE-VISION UPDATE

DCC Re-Vision Update

Members of the DCC community gathered on Sunday April 13 to begin a process of congregational discernment with the goal of clarifying the mission of Dublin Community Church as we consider where God is calling our congregation in the next season of ministry.

In Part I of this process (ReView), Rev. Lisa and Rev. Becky led discussion highlighting the ministries of Dublin Community Church that have been most meaningful to the faith development of the congregation. Participants considered the following questions:

- How have you seen or experienced the presence of God, the love of Christ, or the vibrancy of the Holy Spirit within the context of ministry to the DCC family?
- ...within the context of DCC's ministry to the local community?
- ...within the context of DCC's ministry beyond the local community?

The response was overwhelming, showing the breadth and variety of ministries that comprise our life together at DCC. The final task of that gathering was for each discussion group to prioritize the ministries listed in each area, highlighting those they believed to be most central to our congregational identity.

When those responses were compiled and aggregated into themed groups, the vast majority of these most foundational ministries and values fit into the following eight categories:

- Openness/Celebrating diversity/Extravagant welcome (This included comments referencing overall culture and attitudes as well as welcoming community groups into our physical space)-10 responses
- Interfaith and ecumenical engagement (Among other things, this included comments relating to WORD [Women of Religious Diversity] and our Confirmation program's efforts to expose youth to other faith traditions)-7 responses
- Global engagement, outreach, and support (Including the Young Ambassadors Program and the UCC's 5 for 5 offerings)-4 responses
- Outpouring of love to church members in times of need-3 responses
- Accessible, visible ministers with relevant messages-3 responses
- Mission trips-3 responses
- Outward focus-3 responses
- Dublin Food Pantry-2 responses

In Part II of our ReVision process (ReClaim) beginning after worship on Sunday June 1, we will examine each of these values and ministries in turn, drawing connections to Holy Scripture to find where DCC's story connects to God's story. In this, we will further examine how God is working through the ministries of DCC and reclaim those biblical stories as our own.

Those who plan to attend are invited to begin considering how the bullet points listed above relate to specific stories or passages in scripture. Consider...what story or passage does each bullet point remind you of? And if you can't think of any, don't worry—Rev. Lisa and Rev. Becky will come prepared with some passages in mind. We hope you will join us for this discussion (and potluck) after worship on June 1 in the Goodwill Room.

THE DCC FOUNDATION ANNOUNCES 2025 GRANTS

The Dublin Community Church Foundation announced a 30% increase in Grants for the year 2025 as compared with the year 2024 on May 25, 2025.

The increase in grant making was made possible, in part, from the addition of the Carol McAdow Memorial Fund to the total assets of the DCC Foundation during 2025. There also was an increase in investment income for the year.
